That day, for a moment in time, a Haralson County ball field was one of the happiest places on earth. Well, mark your calendars because another MY TURN baseball game will be taking place <u>on May 4th at 9:00 a.m. at the Haralson County Rec Department field</u>. You don't want to miss it. That first MY TURN ball game was the catalyst for the Haralson County community to come together to build a MY TURN adaptive sports field. An adaptive field is one that accommodates special needs by providing handicapped accessible bathrooms, dugouts, special turf that allows wheelchairs to run, level bases, etc. Many of you have contributed to this special field, and we cannot thank you enough. You see, this is not just about raising money. It is about getting everyone, countywide, to participate and give support to this special project. What an opportunity for the whole county to come together as a team! Bremen, Tallapoosa, Buchanan, Waco and Haralson County are all on board and working as a crew. I applaud Haralson County Commission Chairman Ronnie Ridley who has led the pack for the county to make the land and other county resources available while also providing his personal support. Thank you so much, Mr. Chairman, for realizing that these kids need their own field. Why? Not only do they need the safety and accessibility of an adaptive field, but when they have to wait in line for the use of any field, their turn never comes. They have to play when no one else wants to, leaving them to watch normal kids always going first with the best stuff.
